



Flag Retirement Box at Caldwell Park

Local Boy Scout, Brody Barnhart recently completed and installed flag retirement boxes for his Eagle Scout project which are intended to help area residents deposit their faded and tattered flags for proper destruction. One of those boxes is now installed at Caldwell Park, adjacent to the front parking lot of the Environmental Learning Center. The other box is located at the VFW in Oskaloosa.

Barnhart designed the boxes and had them built to help people learn about flag etiquette and the importance of properly retiring a flag. When is your flag ready to retire? Sometimes your flag will only need to be cleaned by machine washing it in mild detergent and cold water to restore its original appearance. Regular cleaning of your flag can extend its life considerably. Flags should be hung to dry or laid flat. Do not fold the flag if it is damp. Mending a tattered flag is recommended. When you believe your flag is unable to be repaired or is too tattered, then the flag is ready to be retired. The retirement box at Caldwell Park is now one of the local options to retire your flag.

Nature Notes



Winter Bird Feeding by Laura DeCook, MCCB Naturalist

Bird feeding is one of the most popular recreational activities enjoyed by people across the country. Do you plan on feeding birds this winter? The best time to start feeding birds in Iowa is during October or early November. During the fall season, birds are exploring and locating their winter-feeding areas. If you have your feeders up by the first part of November, more birds will likely visit your feeders during the winter.

When preparing an area for bird feeding, you must first consider the basic needs for wildlife. Like humans, wildlife need food, water and shelter in order to survive. Certain plants can easily provide food for birds. Sunflowers and honeysuckles are good food sources in the fall. Crabapples, rose hips, nut-bearing trees, and vines such as grapes and bittersweet are good winter food sources. Areas that have flowers such as Black-eyed susans, goldenrod, coneflower, sumac, marigolds and zinnias provide seeds during the winter. A source of water is also important for the birds.

When planning a location for winter bird feeding and viewing, try to place your feeders where they are out of the wind, in a place for you to easily view them and have easy access to fill them when needed. Also, hang the feeders near cover such as trees or shrubs which provide perching areas for birds to wait for their turn to feed or fly to for protection if a predator is nearby. If you do not have cover available, you can easily build a temporary one by creating a brush pile or use old Christmas trees.

One of the most attractive sources of food for birds is sunflower seed. Black oil sunflower seeds are the most popular and it is high in protein and fat. The next popular seed is white proso millet, followed by suet and peanuts. Niger thistle seed is more expensive, but very popular with American goldfinches and house finches. Did you know that birds eat 30 to 80 percent of their body weight per day?

Birds have different types of bodies, bills, and feet so they tend to have different feeding styles. When selecting a feeder, you can make or purchase different types of feeders to attract different types of birds.

Ground feeders attract cardinals, blue jays, pheasants, quail, pigeons, mourning doves, juncos and various sparrows. These birds often feed on seed that has spilled from hanging feeders. These birds can be fed with food placed upon the ground or in a tray mounted on a stationary object such as a post, stump or deck railing. Placing this feeder 5 to 10 feet from your house would provide an ideal distance for viewing.

Hanging feeders attract goldfinches, chickadees, nuthatches, pine siskins and woodpeckers. These feeders often sway in the wind – and the birds do not mind this. Just remember to place the hanging feeders at least 5 feet off the ground and out of jumping reach of squirrels.

Clinging feeders do not provide perches and come in a variety of styles. Birds with feet adapted for grabbing are attracted to these feeders. The hairy, downy and red-bellied woodpeckers will be seen at clinging feeders because their feet enable them to grab this type of feeder. Clinging feeders include log feeders, an onion bag filled with suet, or a dead tree.

Birds tend to feed in different areas, so you may want to provide different types of feeders. This will also ensure a wide variety of bird species visiting your yard throughout the winter!




Disc Golf 101
