

MCCB Takes On Exciting New Projects

There are a lot of exciting things going on with Mahaska County Conservation. As you may know we now have a full body Woolly mammoth replica in the Environmental Learning Center! This display really adds to the experience when you come to the ELC. Many people are in awe when they look at the size of the mammoth and realize that these creatures once roamed Mahaska County.

Another very exciting project is taking place at the ELC as well. We are planning and beginning to raise funds for a new outdoor feature. We have a design concept and estimated cost to build a natural playscape and amphitheater on the west side of the ELC. (see design concept on p. 2) This playscape will be professionally designed and built to be extremely unique and beautiful. There will be climbing structures, tunnels, and other unique outdoor themed play opportunities. It will not only be for the children, but there will also be many different areas for anyone to sit under a shade structure surrounded by native plants. Local art sculptures also will be incorporated in the designs as much as possible. It will be a great place to bring the kids or grandchildren, let them play while you read a book, or birdwatch.

It has been a busy summer for Mahaska County Conservation with park maintenance, environmental education programs, extending the visiting hours at the Environmental Learning Center and an open house to welcome the Woolly mammoth skeleton exhibit. The extent of work accomplished could not have been done without the diligent help of two programs that joined up with our staff: the Green Iowa AmeriCorps and Iowa STEM Teacher Externship program.

The **Green Iowa AmeriCorps** crew joined us with the help of William Penn University's Career Services Coordinator, Debbie Stevens. Debbie is Green Iowa AmeriCorps Host Site Director in this area. We want to thank the college students that have helped us in the parks and at the Environmental Learning Center this summer: *Aubrey Brown, Kristine Jaennette, Rosemary Miller, Lawson Morris, Cheyenne Reak, Lindsay Reak, and Emma Stephens.*

The **Iowa Stem Teacher Externship** program helps teachers bring their curriculum to life by teaming up with businesses and organizations that relate to their field of teaching. MCCB has had two teacher externs join us this summer. *Nicole Craig*, the Vocational Agriculture teacher at Tri-County High School, has been working at the Eddyville Dunes Sand Prairie on prairie restoration, an effort to improve habitat for endangered native plants and animals such as the Pale green orchid and Ornate box turtle. *Stephanie Visser*, an Oskaloosa High School science teacher, has been working with the naturalist, Laura DeCook, at day camps, public programs and caring for live animals at the Environmental Learning Center. She has also spent some time helping at the Eddyville Sand Dunes Prairie.

NATURE NOTES

Monarch Butterflies



Summer will soon wind down and the fall season will take its place. Nature events in the fall can be enjoyable after a hot summer – such as the tree leaves turning colors, cooler temperatures, and the migration of monarch butterflies (*Danaus plexippus plexippus*).

Unlike most other insects in temperate climates, monarch butterflies cannot survive a long, cold winter. Instead, they spend the winter in southern roosting areas. Driven by seasonal changes, monarchs west of the Rocky Mountains travel to the southwest California coast. Monarchs from Iowa and the rest of those found east of the Rocky Mountains fly farther south to the highlands in central Mexico. They are the only butterflies to make such a long, two-way migration every year. Amazingly, they fly in masses to the same winter roosts and often return to the exact same trees. However, instead of the same butterfly returning to Mexico year after year, it's their children's grandchildren that return south the following fall.

Monarch migration is fascinating! They travel much farther than all other tropical butterflies. One individual monarch's migration trip placed it into the Guinness' Book of World's Records. This monarch was tagged in Ontario, Canada and then recaptured in the over-wintering grounds of Mexico. It had traveled a straight-lined distance of 2,880 miles! Butterflies do not travel in a straight line, so its actual distance was probably twice the number of miles. Another interesting monarch fact is that some hang gliders and balloonists have reported seeing monarchs flying as high as 7,000 feet. If monarchs catch the right wind currents and thermals during migration, they can fly as fast as 50 miles per hour!



Given the great numbers of monarchs (up to 300 million) that gather to migrate each fall, it is hard to imagine them facing any threat of extinction. But monarchs are seriously threatened by weather and human activities in both their summer and over-wintering sites. In the United States and Canada, monarch habitat is threatened by the loss of their host plants. Milkweed is a plant that monarch caterpillars feed on exclusively. Milkweeds are vulnerable to herbicides used by many landscapers, farmers, and gardeners. Weather, such as the drought recently experienced in the southern United States also has a huge impact on monarch numbers.

Monarch populations are also vulnerable in their over-wintering sites in Mexico and California. Timber harvesting of Oyamel trees that monarchs overwinter on, and unseasonable rain and devastating mudslides can greatly affect butterflies.



- **Park Stewards** - This volunteer position allows you to "adopt" one or more Mahaska County Conservation areas and become stewards of those natural areas. This program allows the freedom to work according to your own schedule and interests with the guidance of MCCB staff. All training, tools, equipment, and expertise necessary for volunteers to carry out stewardship duties are provided by MCCB. You will need to complete a volunteer training session to become a Park Steward. **Park Stewards are asked to complete a Park Steward Completion Form after a volunteer activity in one of our county parks.**
