Spring has Sprung!

I know many of you have had cabin fever this past winter! Well, if it makes you feel any better, it is safe to say that spring is finally here. Spring is one of my favorite times of year for a variety of reasons. You begin to see species of wildlife reappear that had either migrated or was hibernating. For some people, redwinged blackbirds are their official sign of spring. Others look for turkey vultures returning or even the first sight of a thirteen-lined ground squirrel running along the side of the road to let them know spring has arrived.

Did you know that there is a brief period when there are woodland wildflowers blooming before most other flowers? These early flowers are spring ephemerals. They are referred to as ephemerals is because they only last for a very short period. The reason for this, is that the plants need to complete their lifecycle before any tree leaves emerge and shade the forest floor. This creates a very short window of time to get out and go hiking to enjoy this unique time of year.

Some of the more common spring ephemerals are hepaticas, bluebells, spring beauties, trout lily, bloodroot and Dutchman's breeches. There are many more to discover as well! You can search for these flowers while enjoying hikes at Russell Wildlife Area, Quercus Wilderness Area, Cedar Bluffs Natural Area and many more areas throughout Mahaska County. Morel Mushrooms

One of lowa's favorite hunting seasons is coming soon – mushroom hunting! Warm, wet weather helps create a good mushroom hunting season. So do nature's other springtime signs such as budding lilacs, flowering trilliums, spring beauties, bluebells and dandelions. Morels are one of everyone's favorite fungi to eat and they can soon be found after a few sunny spring days.

What makes morel mushrooms appear? Why do they appear after a few sunny days after a rain? The answer is the sun's warmth makes them grow. Ground temperature plays the most critical role in mushroom development. (Some diehard mushroom hunters will leave a thermometer in the ground each spring to tell them when conditions are right). When the ground temperature is 58 degrees Fahrenheit, then it is time to go scouting for morels. However, if you don't keep track of the ground temperature, you can also count on the air temperature being in the 50's at night and 60's or higher during the day.

The morel "mushroom" is the reproductive part of the mushroom - the same way an apple is only one fruit on a whole apple tree. The main part of the morel mushroom is underground and consists of a web of hair-like fibers called mycelium.



Mycelium is present even when we don't see any mushrooms on the surface. Mushrooms can have mycelia that stretch for miles and miles underground. Researchers believe the fruiting body (the part we like to eat) is grown in response to starvation or stress on the mycelium; a last effort to spread the spores and reproduce.

Ask most people what types of spring mushrooms they like best and they'll tell you the little grays or the big yellows. These "two" common mushrooms are different growth phases of morels from three different species: *Morchella esculenta, Morchella deliciousa,* and *Morchella crassipes.* The morels are probably the most prized of all edible mushrooms, possibly because they are so easy to distinguish from poisonous mushrooms or maybe because they taste so good!

By now you're ready to run out and find some right? Well, where do you start looking? Every mushroom hunter has their own secret mushroom hunting spots, and many of them are somehow associated with trees. Starting your search in the woods is a safe bet. Underneath dead elms are highly touted as *the* location to find morels. Morels can be found under a variety of trees: oaks, black locust, cherry, walnuts, hickories, ash, and birch to name a few. I have personally found mushrooms on the edge of the woods, deep in the timber and along wooded fence rows, but there has always been some species of tree around.

Another potential mushroom hunting hot spot could be a burned forest. A year or two after the burn seems to be a good time for good morel production.

Of course, there's also the theories we have heard over the years: the east-west fence line theory, the old apple orchard theory, the old railroad bed theory, the river bottom theory, and the trees with slipping bark theory. Morels are not very picky about where they grow, compared to other types of mushrooms. The truth about finding the best morel stash is...... that morels are where you find them. Good luck hunting this spring!




