Eddyville Sand Dunes

55 acres of the Eddyville Dunes are managed by the MCCB. Here you'll find windblown sand dunes dotted with several open water wetlands and wet meadows. Located on the outskirts of Eddyville, IA this is one of the most unique sand prairie remnants in the Midwest; an ecosystem that has disappeared from lowa except for a few small areas around the state. On a hike over the dunes you can often find rare plants and animals such as prickly pear cactus, pale green orchid, 6-lined race runner lizards and ornate box turtles.

The Eddyville Sand Dunes are part of a very unique sand/soil based grassland, wetland and woodland complex. This area was formed when the Des Moines lobe of the Wisconsin glacier retreated and left behind huge deposits of sand, silt and clay in an outwash plain. Strong westerly winds blew these deposits dropping the heavier sand particles on the east side of major drainages (rivers) and the lighter silt and clay particles deposited much further to the east. This sand deposition is up to 60 feet deep in places and has created a somewhat rare dry upland that holds plant and animal species far removed from their original range. Eddyville Sand Dunes' dry sandy uplands interspersed with wetlands and scattered woodlots have created a very diverse ecosystem that is rare in lowa. Dr. Jim Christiansen of Drake University performed the field investigations as part of the Environment Impact Statement and stated that the Eddyville site represents "one of the most complete, although fragile, prairie communities present in lowa". Dry sand prairies like those at the Eddyville Sand Dunes, are classified by the lowa Natural Areas Inventory as very important natural resources.



Nature Notes

Ornate Box Turtles

The ornate box turtle is the only fully terrestrial turtle found in lowa. These turtles prefer a sandy habitat that is suitable for nesting and overwintering. The sand dunes need to be open, shifting and unstable. In order to keep cool in the summertime sun, they search for tall prairie grass or shrubs for protection. The Eddyville Sand Dunes located in Mahaska County is one of the few places where these turtles are found in lowa.

Ornate box turtles grow to be about 5 inches long across their carapace. The carapace, or top part of the shell, is highly domed and resembles a tortoise shell. It is uniquely marked with yellow radiating lines on a black or brown ground color. The plastron, or bottom part of the shell, has a single front hinge that allows this turtle to completely close its shell. The plastron is yellow with many well defined dark wavy stripes. The turtle's skin color is dark, from black to olive, and there are numerous yellow, orange, or red spots on the front legs and head. The feet are not webbed and have a rather club-like appearance.

In lowa, ornate box turtles are listed as a threatened species and it is illegal to take one and keep it as a pet or to sell it. There are several reasons why these turtles are listed as endangered. Loss of habitat is a major reason. Nest predation, being killed by vehicles on roadways and being collected as pets, are other reasons for decreasing ornate turtle populations.

The Mahaska County Conservation Board has a new education turtle living at the conservation center. It is an ornate box turtle that had lived with the Polk County Conservation Board for several years. It has come to Mahaska County to represent a native population found at the Eddyville Sand Dunes. It will be an addition to the other educational animals found in the conservation center at the Russell Wildlife Area. MCCB has special permits to care for educational animals such as box turtles, aquatic turtles, snakes, fish and a salamander. So come on out to the conservation center this summer and visit the ornate box turtle!
