Natural Gems in Mahaska County

One of the definitions of a *gem* is "a person or thing considered to be outstandingly good or special in some respect". So, what is outstandingly good or special regarding nature in Mahaska County? Mahaska County has a great diversity in plants and wildlife in its parks and natural areas and the Environmental Learning Center is becoming a unique place of its own.

The Mahaska County Conservation Board manages over 1,700



acres of forests, wetlands, prairies and parks for people to explore throughout Mahaska County. This includes 21 separate parks, river accesses and wildlife areas with over six miles of maintained trails. The daily park maintenance is done by our park rangers and seasonal employees. You may see them in the county parks mowing, trimming, burning and seeding prairies and food plots, and assisting campers at the campground, which are only a few of the things they do. They are the strong arms that keep our areas beautiful and maintained.

There are abundant wildlife and plants throughout Mahaska County. One of the unique plant species is Ground Pine, a clubmoss that resembles miniature coniferous trees, which is found at Russell Wildlife Area. Cedar Bluffs State Preserve is a fantastic area to look for spring woodland flowers. Dutchman's Breeches,

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Columbine, Mayapples and Bloodroot are common in this area. If you venture off the trail to explore creeks at Cedar Bluffs, you will find rare ferns such as Goldie's Wood Fern and Silvery Glade Fern, mosses, and lichens. Iowa's only terrestrial turtle, the Ornate Box turtle, resides in the Eddyville Sand Dunes. The North Skunk River, South Skunk River and Des Moines River are Mahaska County's three major rivers that are great places for fishing and boating.



The Environmental Learning Center at Caldwell Park is located on the east edge of Oskaloosa on Hwy 92. This is Mahaska County's newest gem for the county residents and visitors. The "ELC" is easily accessible right off the highway and also from the Mahaska Community Recreational trail that loops through Oskaloosa. When you visit inside the center, you will find information about Mahaska County's history, ecosystems, conservation and wildlife. Woolly mammoth bones were discovered in 2010 and bones from these mega animals

are on display. Kids enjoy the opportunity to "dig up" replica mammoth bones in the bone-digging table. Another highlight inside the ELC is

a 1,000 gallon fish aquarium that gives an underwater view of some of our native fish species. Other animals such as snakes, salamanders and turtles provide educational opportunities. The ELC has a classroom called the Discovery Lab that is used for many educational programs. The lower level of the ELC has a larger classroom or meeting space and it is currently the location of a travelling snake exhibit.

- They live in a large burrow called a sette.
- They are active during the day and spend time underground mending and expanding their settes.
- They eat a large variety of vegetation and supplement their diet with insects, snails and grubs.
- They use a shrill whistle-like warning call to alert other groundhogs of danger. The call gives them a nickname "whistle pig".
- They are one of few animals that enter a true hibernation during the winter.
