


Nature Playscape is Becoming a Reality in Mahaska County

Mahaska County Conservation has made great strides with the planning and fundraising for an outdoor nature playscape and amphitheater. These features will be located on the west side of the Environmental Learning Center and will be very accessible from the recreational bike trail and the ELC parking lot. The playscape will consist of climbing



structures, tunnels, and other unique outdoor themed play opportunities for kids of all abilities. It will not only be designed as a play area for children, but also a relaxing area for anyone who wants to enjoy nature.

To make this plan a reality, Mahaska County Conservation has been steadily working on fundraising efforts to raise the \$500,000 needed for the project. The efforts are paying off because we have been (Continued on pg. 2)

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
awarded grants and have received some donations. This is a list of grants and donations that have been acquired so far to reach the goal for the nature playscape and amphitheater:

Squirrels in Iowa

lowa has four species of tree squirrels, but it's the fox squirrels (Sciurus niger) and eastern gray squirrels (Sciurus carolinensis) that are seen most often in Mahaska County. The nocturnal southern flying squirrels (Glaucomys volans) are rarely seen, and red squirrels (Tamiasciurus hudsonicus) live in the mixed pine forests of northern lowa. Both fox and gray squirrels can be found in heavily forested areas. You can tell the difference between the two species by their size and color. Fox squirrels are bigger



(averaging one to three pounds) and have grizzled gray fur on the back with rusty orange bellies. The smaller gray squirrel (3/4 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds) has lighter gray fur dorsally and white belly fur.

As temperatures begin to drop in the fall, squirrels can be seen carrying mouthfuls of dry leaves from the forest floor to their nests high in the tree branches. A squirrel's nest is called a dray. The leaf nest or dray is built by squirrels by making a framework of twigs and then piles of leaves are added layer upon layer. The squirrel hollows out a nest cavity in the center of the leaves.

If a squirrel can find an older tree with hollow cavities in the limbs, it will use that for shelter. Using a hole in a tree is a lot less work and makes a sturdy shelter. In some parts of lowa, it can be challenging to find big old trees full of holes and rotten limbs. What looks like a five-star hotel to a squirrel are the trees that people sometimes cut down for lumber or firewood. Sometimes old trees get cut down just because they appear unsightly.



On winter days with heavy snowfall or freezing rain, oak hickory forests are very quiet. Squirrels are not out scurrying around, cutting nuts, rustling leaves, or scolding people – all which would betray their presence. If they do venture out for food in the winter, foraging for buried nuts can be risky for squirrels. If squirrels' food does not produce enough energy, then their vital layer of insulated fat will be steadily lost, and they may not survive the winter.

Somewhere, in a tree near you, a squirrel is getting ready to survive an lowa winter. Take some time this season for a closer look at these amazing little critters!



Squirrels are quick and nimble, but they could get stuck if they run into tight places too fast! To check out the size of a hide hole, squirrels use whiskers not only on their faces, but on their legs. These highly sensitive hairs allow the animal to feel how close the sides are of a hideaway.

We will explore how understanding the difference between greed and need helps our natural resources.




Coffee Club at the ELC 9:00-10:00 am



- To make one pound of honey, honeybees must gather nectar from nearly 2 million flowers.
- A queen bee can produce up to 2,000 eggs per day.
- Bees communicate with each other by dancing.
- A single bee would need to fly nearly 90,000 miles, or three times around the earth, to make one pound of honey.
- The average speed of a worker honeybee is about 15-20 mph when flying to a food source.
- The only insect that produces food that humans eat is the honeybee.
- A colony of bees consists of 20,000-60,000 bees and one queen.
