# Searching For Northern Saw Whet Owls

Northern Saw-whet owls (*Aegolius acadicus*) are one of the smallest raptors found in Iowa and across the United States. They are small, only 8 inches tall and weigh about 3 ounces. During the cold winter months in Iowa, they can be found in a wooded area with thick cover, mostly conifers or within a thick tangle of shrubs. With a little searching in the right places, you can find saw-whets during the



daytime. Amazingly, they can be found in parks and on trails with frequent human activity!

Finding a Saw-whet owl is a fun wintertime experience! It is worth bundling up on a cold day to look for them. To help you successfully locate Saw-whets, here are a few tips:

- 1. Look for them sitting on branch in conifers, especially cedar trees. They are rarely found higher than 10 feet up in a tree. The ones I have found were perched on a branch at eye level! They will also hide out in groves of pine and spruce trees.
- 2. It is also important for these owls to have a source of water nearby. Their roost is almost always near a creek, lake, pond or river because hunting near the edge of the water next to trees provides a good diversity of prey for hunting. They will hunt for small mammals, birds, bats, and occasionally insects. Since Saw-whets are so small, they must watch out for predators such as larger raptors, including owls and hawks.
- 3. Look for owl poop! This is a good indicator of a tree housing an owl. Saw-whet owl poop appears thick and chalky and leaves white splashes on tree branches and on the ground below. Since owls often sit in the same tree all day, they often leave quite a few droppings.
- 4. Another sign of owls in the area are pellets on the ground. These are non-digestible fur and bones from prey that are coughed up by the owl. The pellets for Saw-whets will be smaller compared to larger owls such as the Great Horned or Barred owls. For Saw-whets, one mouse would last for two meals.
- 5. Look in small tree cavities. If the sun is shining directly on the tree cavity on a cold day, there could be an owl basking in the sunshine. The best practice for searching in tree cavities is to use binoculars, scopes, or a camera lens to look for activity. Northern Saw-whets sit very still, so wait patiently for any movement.
- 6. Use other birds to let you know where they are. All birds of prey are subject to mobbing (harassment from other birds). A Saw-whet's diet is mostly small mammals, but songbirds are subject to be meals, too. When flocks of chickadees and nuthatches sound alarmed with long, agitated calls, there is a possibility of an owl nearby.



Northern Saw-whet owls may freeze their food to eat at a later time. When they want to eat it, they will take it back to the roost and lay on it so it will thaw for eating!



## A Woolly Mammoth Is Coming To The ELC!



Afterwards, the Mahaska County Conservation Board had the privilege to help dig up the bones. Today, these bones are on display inside the Environmental Learning Center. They are fascinating to see and have been a great asset in teaching the public about our ice age history.

When the Environmental Learning Center was designed and built, MCCB wanted to have a life-sized Woolly mammoth skeleton on exhibit. We are excited to announce that a replica skeleton will be arriving at the Environmental Learning Center soon! The replica skeleton was paid for by the Midwest*One* Bank in Oskaloosa and is being built by Elemoose in Springfield, Missouri. MCCB is planning an open house for the public to come and see this mammoth inside the


