## Green lowa AmeriCorps Assist with County Park Improvements

# NATURE NOTES

# Big Dipper Fireflies Photinus pyralis

Fireflies are in the insect family of Lampyridae which consist of roughly 136 different beetles which flash over the United States and Canada alone. They are found on every continent except Antarctica.

The light at the end of fireflies flash in different patterns for each species. The pattern helps the same-species fireflies find each other for courtship. The flashes can be identified by how long the flash can be seen, what motion the light is making and how high above ground the flash occurs. The male firefly of the species *Photinus pyralis* or the Big Dipper firefly, the most common firefly in lowa, beams a single half-flash during a forward rising flight movement. It looks like the letter "J." The female responds with a single flash.

The flashing light occurs because of an internal chemical reaction called bioluminescence. Amazingly, this light allows them to glow without wasting heat energy. An incandescent light bulb gives off 90% of its energy as heat and only 10% as light. If fireflies produced that much heat when they lit up, they would not survive. We don't often see fireflies before they reach adulthood, so you might not know that fireflies glow in all life stages. Bioluminescence is present throughout the entire life cycle; the eggs, larvae, pupae, and adult can produce light.

Fireflies over-winter as larvae buried in the soil and emerge in the spring. In summer, they pupate for about 2½ weeks within a small earthen cell before emerging as adults. The adult fireflies signal each other with their lights. Females wait on the ground for passing males to flash their signal, and then answer with their own specific signal. Then they meet up and mate. The female's eggs are laid on or slightly under the soil a few days after mating. Within 4 weeks, the eggs hatch and the larvae, once hatched, begin to feed until fall. Then they burrow underground and hibernate to start a life cycle over again.

Firefly Catching Tip:

If you catch fireflies to look at in a jar, pierce the lid with holes to help them breathe and consider adding a damp paper towel. After getting a good look, let them go after a while preferably keeping them for no more than an hour. Adult fireflies only live for a week or two, so staying in a jar for too long of time cuts into their ability to continue the life cycle.


